If it's anything like Bible In a Year, Fr. Mike will read a section and then provide further reflection or explanation. Don't worry if you miss a day or a week. All episodes will continue to be available after they've been published. So you can start any time and move at your own pace.



SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

Readings:

<u>Numbers 6:22–27</u> <u>Psalm 67:2–3, 5–6, 8</u> <u>Galatians 4:4–7</u> <u>Luke 2:16–21</u>

LISTEN HERE

Today we give thanks to Mary, the Mother of God. Her response to the angel, born of a humble heart, brought us life and salvation in the Child conceived in her womb.

From before all ages, God had destined her for this decisive role in salvation history. She was to be the woman who in the fullness of time would bear God's only Son, as Paul tells us in today's Epistle.

In times past, God spoke to His chosen people, the Israelites, through prophets (see Hebrews 1:1–2), and imparted His blessings upon them through His priests, as we hear in today's First Reading.

But now, He has sent His Son to reveal His glory and His kingdom, to make His way of salvation known to all nations, as we sing in today's Psalm. In the Infant lying in the manger, God has shone His face upon us (see John 14:8–9).

Jesus is made a child of Israel, an heir of God's covenant with Abraham, by His circumcision in today's Gospel (see Genesis 17:1–14). And we have been made adopted sons and daughters by Baptism, which is the circumcision of Christ, the true circumcision (see Colossians 2:11; Philippians 3:3).

As children of God, Paul says today, we are heirs of the Father's blessings, which He promised to bestow on all peoples through the descendants of Abraham (see Genesis 12:3; 22:18; Galatians 3:14). This is the blessing that Aaron imparted to Israel, the people descended from Abraham. And this blessing comes to us through Mary and the Child.

This is the good news of great joy that the shepherds make known in Bethlehem today (see Luke 2:10).

Like the shepherds, we too should make haste today to find Jesus with Mary and Joseph, to glorify God for His blessings. And like Mary, we should keep His word and reflect upon it, letting it dwell richly in our hearts (see Colossians 3:16).



"And they went with haste, and found Mary and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger. And when they saw it they made known the saying which had been told them concerning this child; and all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them." LUKE 2:16-18



Mary as the "Mother of God" is the first Marian Dogma

The first Marian dogma is the Divine Maternity of Mary, meaning that Mary is the Mother of God. This statement is at the very root of Our Lady's identity and the identity of her Son.

In the first few centuries after Christ's death, many false ideas about Him developed. Some said that Jesus had divine powers and a unique relationship with God the Father but was not divine. Therefore, since Jesus was not God, His death on the cross could not pay the infinite and eternal debt of sin for all mankind. Others believed that Jesus was an ordinary man and we could, as he did, earn our own place in heaven without God's mercy. "We have no need for God," this heresy claimed—only a need to "be good people."

Those who rejected the divinity of Jesus Christ did so in part because they refused to believe that God would be born of a woman. Humble Mary may have given birth to Jesus the man, they reasoned, but no woman could give birth to God Almighty. Thus, they reasoned, Jesus could not be God. They rejected Mary, and so rejected the fullness of Christ Himself.

In 431, the bishops of the Church held an ecumenical council at Ephesus. There, the bishops declared—with the authority of the Apostles—that Mary was Theotokos, the "God-bearer." She was the person—not an angel or spirit from heaven, but the person—who carried the God-man in her womb and gave birth to Him. Jesus, who was God Himself, was incarnate of the Virgin Mary and became man.

But Jesus is God. Mary gave birth to Jesus. She did not just give birth to His human nature—mothers are not mothers of "natures" but of "persons"—and since Our Lady gave birth to the Person of Jesus Christ, she is honored with the title "Mother of God."

This radical declaration of faith—that a poor woman from Nazareth gave birth to the Word Incarnate—is vital for truly understanding the person of Jesus Christ. It is only through the recognition of Mary's identity as Divine Mother that we can understand our own salvation.

Through the authority of His Church on earth, God has revealed to us four essential truths about Mary's identity, otherwise known as "the Marian dogmas."

To be in full communion with Christ — the Church reminds us — we must believe in each of these dogmas. In other words, they aren't optional beliefs.

Why would the Church treat these dogmas with such seriousness?

First, because they have been revealed by God.

Second, because through them, we understand truths about Jesus.

Coming Soon!


