## SUNDAY LITURGY REFLECTION

Readings: Acts 8:5–8, 14–17 Psalm 66:1–7, 16, 20 1 Peter 3:15–18 John 14:15–21



Jesus will not leave us alone. He won't make us children of God in Baptism only to leave us "orphans," He assures us in today's Gospel (see <u>Romans 8:14–17</u>).

He asks the Father to give us His Spirit, to dwell with us and keep us united in the life He shares with the Father.

We see the promised gift of His Spirit being conferred in today's First Reading.

The scene from Acts apparently depicts a primitive Confirmation rite. Philip, one of the first deacons (see <u>Acts 6:5</u>), proclaims the Gospel in the non-Jewish city of Samaria. The Samaritans accept the Word of God (see <u>Acts 17:11; 1 Thessalonians 2:13</u>) and are baptized.

It remains for the Apostles to send their representatives, Peter and John, to pray and lay hands on the newly baptized—that they might receive the Holy Spirit. This is the origin of our Sacrament of Confirmation (see <u>Acts 19:5–6</u>), by which the grace of Baptism is completed and believers are sealed with the Spirit promised by the Lord.

We remain in this grace so long as we love Christ and keep His commandments. And, strengthened in the Spirit whom Jesus said would be our Advocate, we are called to bear witness to our salvation—to the tremendous deeds that God has done for us in the name of His Son.

In today's Psalm, we celebrate our liberation. As He changed the sea into dry land to free the captive Israelites, Christ suffered that He might lead us to God, as we hear in today's Epistle.

This is the reason for our hope—the hope that sustains us in the face of a world that cannot accept His truth, the hope that sustains us when we are maligned and defamed for His name's sake.

Put to death in the flesh, He was brought to life in the Spirit, Paul tells us today. And as He himself promises: "Because I live, . . . you will live."

"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. 16 And I will pray the Father, and he will give you another Counselor, to be with you for ever, 17 even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him; you know him, for he dwells with you, and will be in you.

# The Gospel at Home

#### **6TH SUNDAY OF EASTER**

#### **Gospel Reading:**

John 14:15-21

Jesus promises his disciples that he will send them another advocate, the Spirit of truth.

#### Background on the Gospel Reading

Today's Gospel is a continuation of last week's Gospel: Jesus is speaking to his disciples at the Last Supper. In today's reading Jesus offers encouragement to his disciples, who will soon see him crucified. He reassures them that even though he will leave them, he will not abandon them. Instead he will send them the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, through whom the disciples will continue to live in union with Jesus.

Jesus uses the term Advocate to describe the Holy Spirit, whom the disciples will receive. Another word used to describe the Holy Spirit is Paraclete, a legal term meaning "one who offers defense for another." Note that Jesus says that he will send "another Advocate." Jesus himself is the first advocate, interceding for his disciples with the Father.

In today's reading Jesus contrasts his impending departure with the permanence of the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus will leave to return to the Father, but the Holy Spirit will remain with the disciples.

Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, the disciples will come to know and appreciate the unity of the Son and the Father. They will also understand that they too participate in the communion between the Father and the Son: "On that day you will realize that I am in my Father and you are in me and I in you" (John 14:20).

Today's reading is one example of the contrast that John's Gospel presents between the community of disciples, to whom God will reveal himself, and the unbelieving world, which will remain in darkness. The unbelieving world cannot accept the "Spirit of truth," whom the disciples will receive. Only through the Spirit will God's revelation and love be known.


#### **Family Connection**

The mystery of the Trinity can be difficult for us to grasp. Today's Gospel invites us to consider how the three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit— work together so that God's salvation is made known to us. Jesus' mission is continued through the activity of the Holy Spirit in the lives of his disciples. We have received this same Spirit through our Baptisms. The Spirit, living and working within us, reveals the mystery of God's love for us. Just as the first disciples were not left orphaned, we are not orphaned; we remain in God's embrace through the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Gather your family and invite each family member to say what he or she knows about the Holy Spirit. Read aloud today's Gospel, John 14:15-21. What does Jesus say the Holy Spirit will do for the disciples? Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we come to share in the love of God made known to us in Jesus. Pray together, thanking God for this gift of the Holy Spirit by praying the <u>Prayer to the Holy Spirit</u>.

"I will not leave you desolate: I will come to you. 19 Yet a little while, and the world will see me no more. but you will see me; because I live, you will live also. 20 In that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. 21 He who has he who loves me will be loved by my Father. and I will love him and manifest myself to him."

JOHN 14:18-21



## The Holy Spirit is our "Advocate"



Sometimes we don't connect the dots. Did you ever notice that the Holy Spirit is referred to as the "Advocate"? An "advocate," in law, is a person who is professionally qualified to plead the cause of another in a court of law. In Hebrew, "Satan" means accuser. At the end of our lives, we will stand in judgement before God. See it now? God is the judge. Satan is the Prosecutor. The Holy Spirit is our Defense Attorney. It would be worth our while to seek His advice! Check out this article from Aleteia to learn more. (Written by Nicholas Senz)

I had a professor who with lamentation used to call the Holy Spirit "the forgotten Person of the Trinity." (In fact, he offered bonus points for anyone who mentioned the Spirit in class.)

There's at least one way in which this is understandable: Whereas we have solid and strong (albeit woefully incomplete) mental images of God the Father (in the figure of the elderly man, the "Ancient of Days" from the Book of Daniel) and actual evidence of what God the Son really looked like as he roamed our earth, a "spirit" is by nature hard to visualize. Sure, Scripture gives us images such as a dove or tongues of fire, but those don't have quite the same sticking power.

But Scripture gives us another image for the Spirit. It may seem odd at first, but it can be helpful: the Holy Spirit is our defense attorney.

Where does this notion come from? In John 14:16-17, Jesus says: "And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always, the Spirit of truth, which the world cannot accept, because it neither sees nor knows it. But you know it, because it remains with you, and will be in you."

That word advocate in Greek is parakleton, which, since Greek is a pliable language, means variously "counselor, comforter, helper, or advocate." An advocate or counselor is one who speaks on our behalf or who offers us guidance. Though this description itself sounds vaguely like an attorney, the connection is much deeper.

The word Satan means "accuser," "adversary," or "one who opposes." We see Satan playing this role very explicitly in the Book of Job, when Satan claims that Job only worships God because Job is so blessed. Here Satan is very much like a prosecutor, standing before God the just judge and claiming that all of humanity is guilty.


