The day will include Mass with Bishop Walkowiak; talks by Father Jonathan Kelly, rector of St. John Vianney College Seminary, and Missionary Meg Hunter-Kilmer; along with a Eucharistic procession to publicly witness to our faith.

explore the Vatican display of Eucharistic Miracles provided by the Mary Our Mother Foundation (some of you may be familiar with this exhibit which has already been hosted by some of our parishes)
participate in Eucharistic Adoration in Our Lady Seat of Wisdom Chapel.

All are invited to stay after the event for a festival which will include live music and food available for purchase from food trucks. The festival will run from 5:30 – 7:30 p.m.

Boxed lunches will be provided to registrants. <u>Registration</u> cost for the day is \$10/person or \$40/family household. Please plan to join us for this day focused on worship of the Blessed Sacrament and growth in our understanding of its mystery.

### SUNDAY LITURGY REFLECTION

Readings: <u>Exodus 34:4–6, 8–9</u> <u>Daniel 3:52–56</u> <u>2 Corinthians 13:11–13</u> <u>John 3:16–18</u>



### LISTEN HERE

We often begin Mass with the prayer from today's Epistle: "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with all of you." We praise the God who has revealed Himself as a Trinity, a communion of persons.

Communion with the Trinity is the goal of our worship—and the purpose of the salvation history that begins in the Bible and continues in the Eucharist and sacraments of the Church.

We see the beginnings of God's self-revelation in today's First Reading, as He passes before Moses and cries out His holy name.

Israel had sinned in worshipping the golden calf (see Exodus 32). But God does not condemn them to perish. Instead He proclaims His mercy and faithfulness to His covenant.

God loved Israel as His firstborn son among the nations (see <u>Exodus</u> <u>4:22</u>). Through Israel—heirs of His covenant with Abraham—God planned to reveal Himself as the Father of all nations (see <u>Genesis 22:18</u>).

The memory of God's covenant testing of Abraham—and Abraham's faithful obedience—lies behind today's Gospel.

In commanding Abraham to offer his only beloved son (see <u>Genesis 22:2</u>, <u>12</u>, <u>16</u>), God was preparing us for the fullest possible revelation of His love for the world.

As Abraham was willing to offer Isaac, God did not spare His own Son but handed Him over for us all (see <u>Romans 8:32</u>).

In this, He revealed what was only disclosed partially to Moses—that His kindness continues for a thousand generations, that He forgives our sin and takes us back as His very own people (see <u>Deuteronomy 4:20; 9:29</u>).

Jesus humbled Himself to die in obedience to God's will. And for this, the Spirit of God raised Him from the dead (see <u>Romans 8:11</u>), and gave Him a name above every name (see <u>Philippians 2:8–10</u>).

This is the name we glorify in today's Responsorial: the name of our Lord, the God who is Love (see 1 John 4, 8, 16).

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. 17 For God sent the Son into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him."

### The Gospel at Home

### THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY

**Gospel Reading:** John 3:16-18 God sent his Son into the world to save the world.

### Background on the Gospel Reading

This week we return to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. This Sunday and next, however, are designated as solemnities—special days that call our attention to central mysteries of our faith. Today on Trinity Sunday we celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity, one God in three persons.

Today's Gospel is from the beginning of John's Gospel. The passage we read follows Jesus' conversation with a Pharisee, Nicodemus, about what it means to be born of both water and the spirit. Nicodemus approaches Jesus at night and acknowledges Jesus as a teacher from God. Jesus tells him that only those who are born from above will see the Kingdom of God. Nicodemus misunderstands and questions how a person can be born more than once. Jesus tells Nicodemus that no one can enter the Kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. Jesus is essentially explaining Baptism, which we celebrate as a sacrament today. Yet Nicodemus, we are told, still does not understand what Jesus is saying. Jesus continues by testifying to the need to be born from above so that one might have eternal life.

After the dialogue with Nicodemus, the author of the Gospel offers his own explanation of Jesus' words. This is what we read in today's Gospel, John 3:16-18.

In the context of today's focus on the mystery of the Holy Trinity, the reading calls our attention to the action of God, who reveals himself in three persons: God the Father, Jesus the Son, and the Holy Spirit. God the Father, out of love for the world, sent his Son into the world in order to save it. Through the death and resurrection of the Son, we have been given the gift of the Holy Spirit. As three persons, God acts always as a God of love; he does not condemn the world but acts to save it.

The Gospel also calls attention to the response that is required of us. God's love for us calls us to respond in faith by professing our belief in God's son, Jesus, and the salvation that he has won for us. This profession of faith is a sign of the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives.

### **Family Connection**

Because of God's great love for us, he sent his Son, Jesus, to save the world. Jesus, in turn, sent the Holy Spirit so that our faith in God and his love would be strengthened. The nurturing experiences of family life also help us to understand and have faith in God's love.

Create a family poster together showing all the ways in which your family experiences God's great love. Use symbols, pictures, and words to show how you have seen God at work in your family life and in our history. Then read together today's Gospel, John 3:16-18. Pray together, thanking God for his gift of love. Conclude by praying the <u>Glory Be to the Father</u> or today's Psalm.

### Trinity Sunday is sometimes called Heresy Sunday

While the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity was born out a response to the Arian Heresy, some theologians jokingly refer to Trinity Sunday as Heresy Sunday because pastors often try to explain the Trinity during their homilies. In doing so, they unwittingly fall into heretical teachings.

Technically, then, it's not "heresy." It's "error." As the Catechism says, "Heresy is the obstinate post-baptismal denial of some truth which must be believed with divine and Catholic faith, or it is likewise an obstinate doubt concerning the same..." (CCC 2089).

The Trinity is one of the "mysteries" of our faith. According to Catholic Answers, "In its strict sense a mystery is a supernatural truth, one that of its very nature lies above the finite intelligence."

Therefore, any analogy, picture or description of the Trinity that we try to use to explain it will fall short in its understanding of this divinely revealed Truth. And sometimes, when we attempt to explain it, we accidentally fall into errors that stem from different <u>historical heresies</u>, some of which are still around us today!
